Funding Appeal – by Peggy

Thanks to the generosity of members, Friends of Sierra Leone has completed another year of successful project funding. Once again a diverse group of projects in various parts of Sierra Leone were supported. Once again, 100% of donations went towards projects. Because Friends of Sierra Leone is totally volunteer led and administered, no project money goes towards salaries or organizational expenses. Not many organizations can make the same claim.

For those of you have donated already, thank you very much. We will continue to use donations to support worthily projects throughout our beloved Salone.

Project Report from Jim Hanson

This year was a year of recovery for Sierra Leone after last year's deadly Ebola epidemic. Our organization was able to contribute over \$16,000 this year in small project grants to help local communities rebuild and more forward. FoSL provided funds for school construction projects in the Bo and Kambia districts, as well as latrines and hand-washing stations for a primary school in Kono District. The Madina School in Kambia was granted \$2650 for a solar lighting project. We were also able to provide funds for two health projects: \$2000 for a malaria prevention and treatment program in Pujehun, and \$3000 for a well and latrines for the Birth Waiting Home in Tikonko.

All of this was made possible by you; our loyal donors. But, there is still a mountain of need throughout the country. Our project selection committee is currently reviewing 8 applications for funding. Three of these are for education of women and girls. There are two agricultural projects, two school construction projects, and one for building latrines and hand-washing stations. Our bank balance at this time will only allow us to approve a couple of these requests. Of course, we would love to do more.

And with your help, we can do just that! Your support during the Ebola crisis was great, and I hope you will continue that effort with your year-end contributions.

Every tax-deductible donation to the FoSL Projects Fund goes straight to Sierra Leone. No highly paid executives bouncing around in Land Rovers with this organization. We work directly with community groups. So if you can, please send a little or a lot to help us help the wonderful people of Sierra Leone. Thank you for support.

FATMATA MATERNITY CENTER- Sierra Leone

Now open for 2 years, the government has noticed our work. To help serve as many people as we are they provided us with another full time nurse at the center. Mariama Lahai and Mariama Bah are our two wonderful nurses. This makes for a total of 7 employees, all supporting their families while improving the community, thanks to your funding.

Thanks to a grant from the Friends of Sierra Leone foundation we are preparing for the 2nd phase of our STOP THE BUG- Malaria Prevention Program. The program goes door to door in six communities to help educate, prevent and stop malaria in it's tracks. In some communities the rate of random testing found more than 50% of people infected with the disease. Our site manager Philip Momoh has done a fantastic job of leading this program.

Lastly, we are excited to share that we have completed our 2nd quarters at the center. In the past, women who had given birth would have to rest in the labor room. This was uncomfortable for all parties. The new unit has three post partum rooms where mothers and babies can rest in comfort. We also have a quarter for a medicine store where we will provide general medications on a cost recovery basis.

We've also reached a milestone 200 HEALTHY BIRTHS at our center.

From Freeborn to Freetown & Back – Patrick O’Leary’s Book

Upon completion of the Peace Corp’s Tanzania XIII training in December 1966 the program was cancelled. Many of the program’s trainees were sent to Sierra Leone and Patrick O’Leary was one of them. He became a Community Development worker with farmers in an upcountry chiefdom. Patrick was bitten by a poisonous snake, drove over and killed a pregnant cow, and began to

raise chickens which were quickly killed by driver ants. Patrick left the village suddenly over a local dispute.

Patrick developed a 40 year relationship with the village chief, a Member of Parliament. During Patrick's PCV service he accompanied the chief to Sierra Leone's diamond area and to the June 1968 reopening of Parliament. In December 1968 when Patrick left the country the chief surprised Patrick by coming to say farewell to him at Freetown's Paramount Hotel as he Pat began to board the bus to Lungi airport. They maintained written correspondence until it was interrupted by the ten year civil war.

In 2004 Patrick returned to Sierra Leone and reconnected with the chief and his family. They continued to speak by phone until the chief's death in 2007. The last house Patrick lived in while in the country was destroyed during the war. Patrick returned to the village but found it had been ravaged during war and was slowly recovering. And then, during the 2014-15 Ebola epidemic, 285 people in the area caught the virus and 99 died.

Mike's lifetime of work with Sierra started with teaching children and schools. The Mike Diliberti Memorial now help ensure secondary school
